EARLY VOTING

Oct 7 – 30, 2026

Early voting hours vary by county. State law sets the standard close at 5:00pm on October 30, but some counties may offer extended hours.

If an emergency prevents you from voting at the polls between the close of early voting and Election Day, you may request an emergency ballot from your County Recorder's Office.

Three ways to register:

Register online

Register online with an Arizona driver's license or non-operating ID number.

Register by mail

Download and complete a voter registration form and mail it to your County Recorder's Office.

Register in person

Visit your County Recorder's Office to fill out a voter registration form in person.

VOTER ID RULES

To register, you need an Arizona driver's license or non-operating ID number. You can register with no proof, but only for federal races until you provide it.

Voting in person

POLLING HOURS

6:00am – 7:00pm

Nov. 3, 2026

As long as you are in line before 7:00pm you may cast your ballot.

What to bring

Valid ID that matches the address on file where you are registered to vote is required. If your photo ID does not match your the address where you are registered, you'll need to present two forms of ID.

One item from List 1 (Photo ID with your address)

- ✓ Valid Arizona driver's license or non-operating ID
- ✓ Tribal ID or enrollment card (with photo)
- ✓ Any other valid U.S. federal, state, or local government photo ID

OR Two items from List 2 (Non-photo ID with address)

| ✓ Utility bill dated within 90 days of Election Day | ✓ Bank or credit union statement dated within 90 days of Election Day |
| ✓ Valid Arizona vehicle registration | ✓ Indian census card |
| ✓ Property tax statement | ✓ Tribal ID or enrollment card |
| ✓ Vehicle insurance card | ✓ Voter registration card |
| ✓ Valid U.S. federal, state, or local government ID | ✓ Any official election mailing with your name and address |

OR Mix-and-match from Lists 1 and 2

- ✓ Any valid photo ID from List 1 with a non-matching address plus a non-photo item from List 2 that matches your registration address
- ✓ U.S. passport plus one item from List 2
- ✓ U.S. military ID plus one item from List 2

You're also allowed to bring personal notes on the ballot issues and candidates with you into the polling place.

DON'T HAVE ID?

You may cast a conditional provisional ballot. You'll then have 5 business days (until Nov. 10, 2026) to present an acceptable photo ID to your County Recorder.

Voting by mail

MAIL VOTING DEADLINES

Last day to request a mail ballot is

Oct. 23, 2026

Mail ballots must be received by

7:00pm Nov. 3, 2026

Who can vote by mail

Any registered Arizona voter may request an early ballot. No excuse is required. You can also join the Active Early Voting List (AEVL) to automatically receive a mail ballot for every election you're eligible to vote in.

How to request your mail ballot

Request a ballot through the Arizona Voter Information Portal or your County Recorder's Office. You can also check the AEVL box on your voter registration form.

Returning your mail ballot

Your ballot must be received by your County Elections Office by 7:00pm on Election Day. A postmark does not count. Mailing your ballot at least a week in advance, bringing it to an early voting location, or using a drop box is recommended. Check your County Elections Office for dropbox locations.

If you're personally unable to return your ballot, it can be returned for you by someone who lives at the same residence, a close family member, or a caregiver.
